Wright can remember being given a battered flashlight, a gun that wouldn't work properly, and the best wishes of the chief when he joined the old Crowland police department some 28 years ago. Yesterday, Inspector Wright retired from a police career that saw service in three different departments.

Born in Wigan, England in Jan., 1912, he came to Canada in 1930 and worked first at the Page Hersey Tubes an later the Atlas Steel before joining the Crowland department in 1943.


In 1948 he was appointed a sergeant and in the following year he was appointed chief, a position he held until the township was annexed by the city of Welland some 11 years later, Mr. Wright was appointed Inspector (uniform branch) in the expanded Welland City police force in Jan. 1971.
